General Information about the University (location, number of students, faculties)	UCCS is located at the East Central portion of Colorado overlooking Pikes Peak. It is 1 hour south of Denver and stands over 1609 meters above sea level. UCCS has approximately 11,300 students, more than 1,150 experienced faculty members and more than 800 devoted staff members.  UCCS has 6 areas of studies: Education, Health Sciences, Business, Engineering and Applied Sciences, Public Service, and Letters, Arts, and Sciences.  UCCS offers 46 Baccalaureate Programs, 23 Master's Programs, 8 Doctoral Programs, and 34 Certificate Programs.  UCCS is part of the Colorado University (CU) system, which has four campuses located in Denver, Boulder, Aurora, and Colorado Springs.

Our Campus	UCCS has one main campus in Colorado Springs that overlooks Pikes Peak. Campus is roughly 1609 meters in length. UCCS offers a free shuttle that has stops throughout campus. Bachelor level students	Due to the courses available for exchange students, we recommend students at the bachelor level to spend a fall semester at UCCS. All students return to campus for the fall semester, so this offers an opportunity to meet fellow students which can be easier than attending during the spring semester.	
Master level students	Students benefit from spending the fall semester at UCCS or staying a full academic year in order to benefit from the progression of courses.	
	Master level courses generally require a completed bachelor's degree.	
"Add and Drop" periods	UCCS allows students to add/drop classes up until the census date—which varies depending on the semester. Once census date has arrived, students must be enrolled in the minimum credit requirements. UCCS will lock student's ability to add/drop classes after census date.
